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















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This magazine, representing our 2023 year, is brought to you by the team that makes up Ōtorohanga College-The College Board, Staff, Students, Parents and Community.

The Board completed strategic planning last weekend, and this quote was shown to us as motivation for our role at this college. It is relevant to every single one of you in this audience, a challenge that when combined, vision with action, of how absolutely powerful that can be.

My name is Kim Ingham and it is my pleasure to be a Board member at this kura, and work alongside some great people, who collectively feel we are now in the wonderful position to take this College and our rangatahi, on an upwards journey to be a College of choice, and one we are all proud to talk about in a very positive light.

The Board has many duties to perform and amongst those are we have to create an environment for our staff that is supportive and well resourced. This year, through sound financial decisions, and with the significant assistance of our Better Off Funding we have been able to resource our college to a level that hasn't been seen for many, many years. This has contributed to the success of our popular Junior Module programme. We sincerely thank Rodney Dow, one of our district's Councillors, who promoted our kura to receive this funding, and we thank the other Councillors who were absolutely supportive as well.

The Board has shown our wonderful staff that we support and appreciate them, by funding Professional Development to a level not seen previously.

We have been working very hard on overdue maintenance at the College, with projects booked in during the next holidays as well. You may not notice the new roofs when you return, but we think you'll notice the quad improvements, stage one of which has been completed. The Ministry dictates we must plan and pay for any of this urgent maintenance before we can assign money to our New Science Block Project. We are hopeful we are nearly to the stage where we can engage an architect to plan the refurbishment of our Library, into 3 new modern fit for purpose Science Laboratories and Classrooms. We also intend to move right through the school, upgrading our classroom environments as funding allows. We are also now aware of the need for more toilet facilities for our rangatahi, and will now begin exploring firstly temporary and then permanent facilities.

The Board has an ongoing focus on ensuring we have a more sustainable Hostel model for the College and our rangatahi moving forward.

With all these and other pieces in place, the Board feels we are well placed to be very focused on lifting student achievement in 2024

On behalf of Co-Chair Duncan and myself to offer some thank yous and the first one is to our fellow Board Members for their commitment to the role. Our Board meetings are robust, strategic, and held in good humour and heart, and always with a lens on our rangatahi. To our teaching and support staff, you are the biggest asset we have and our sincere thank you to all for your dedication to your students you have in your care.

It is incredibly important we care and look after our young people, they are our future. I'm sure the adults in this audience remember back to when a certain teacher made a difference in their lives, we know our staff are capable of doing exactly this.
